Conclusions:

Not enough time is allotted for this subcommittee to completely discuss and delve into the charges made to it or actions contemplated.

Actions taken by FDA and the conference toward Vv in oysters continue to warrant new position statements by the ISSC and FDA.

There is inadequate funding for the ISSC executive office.

The ISSC executive Office and the state coordinators have distributed and continue to distribute Vv educational materials to a variety of requestors in 26 states. (report available)

Education efforts toward retailers and distributors should be improved. A group was assigned to develop possible Vv and Vp education initiatives directed toward retailers and distributors.

Recommendations:

It is recommended that FDA and ISSC update their position statements toward the consumption of raw molluscan shellfish

Seek adequate funding for the ISSC executive office in Vv education efforts.

Charge 2:

Consider effective ways to communicate information to harvesters and dealers regarding risks associated with post harvest growth of Vibrio parahaemolyticus.

Findings:

Follow up to previous Committee recommendations (primary charges):

- 13) Designate a voluntary Vp education coordinator in states with two or more Vp illnesses in the last 5 years. States may include Alaska, Washington, Oregon, California, Georgia, New York, New Jersey, and the Gulf States. Status: Not Done
- 14) Translate Vp harvester and consumer material into Spanish & Vietnamese. Status: Not Done
- 15) Include additional educational materials about Vp online. Status: Done

Conclusions: Recommendations:	The effectiveness of the Vv state coordinators in the performance of their duties in developing networks and promoting Vv educational materials as well as being the central contact have proven extremely beneficial in the efforts to meet the Vv charge to this subcommittee. Vp educational efforts directed toward retailers and distributors are not required but may be the most important link in the proper handling of raw molluscan shellfish to reduce growth of Vp after harvest. A group was assigned to develop possible Vv and Vp education initiative directed toward retailers and distributors It continues to be the recommendation that states having mandatory Vp control programs designate a state coordinator to interact with this subcommittee for the development and distribution of Vp material. Current harvester and consumer information should be translated into Spanish and Vietnamese.
